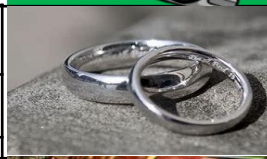


Key Vocabulary...

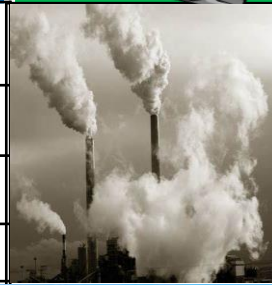

Misuse of the natural world is a concern for Muslims and Christians.

Air, land and water pollution cause problems in the natural world. Christians believe in stewardship and Muslims call this khalifah. This means they have a duty to care for the natural world and protect it. They believe God created the natural world and they have a duty to be stewards of the earth.



Dominion
Christians & Muslims believe humans have dominion over the natural world

Dominion: Christians believe God gave humans dominion, power and authority to take charge of the earth. This means humans can use the natural resources to sustain human life, for food and to enhance their lives. Religion teaches that Adam was the first man on earth and was given the role of stewardship to look after the planet for God.

Always Remember...



Christians and Muslims believe the natural world is a gift from God as God created all life. Humans have a duty to be stewards of the natural world. Human life is holy and sacred as God created all human life.

Abortions are legal up to 24 weeks & two doctors must agree if it meets one of the following situations:

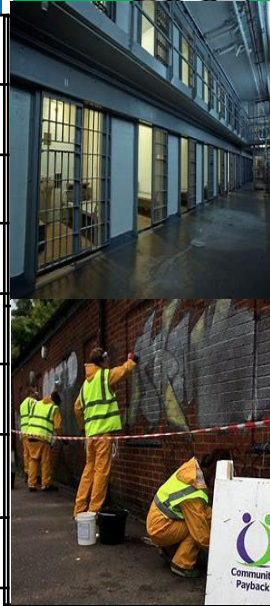
- Risk to mother's life

Key Vocabulary...

Crime	An offence which is punishable by law
Punishment	A legal consequence after being found guilty of breaking the law
Retribution	An aim of punishment- revenge on the criminal
Deterrence	An aim of punishment- to put people off from committing crimes
Reformation	An aim of punishment – to change someone’s behaviour for the better, so they are positive citizens.
Protection	An aim of punishment – to protect innocent people from crime
Corporal punishment	A physical punishment that causes pain
Death penalty	A punishment that puts the prisoner to death for their crimes
Sanctity of life	A belief that all life is holy and sacred as it is created by God
Forgiveness	Christians and Muslims believe in showing mercy for wrongdoing, if the person is truly sorry. Forgiveness is important for a peaceful life.

Prison is a type of punishment

Prison is a punishment for serious crime as criminals are locked away from society and have little freedoms.

Community service is a type of punishment

Community service is a punishment for minor offences and allows the person a chance to reform. It includes 'community payback' by doing supervised work in the community. It can also include treatments should as counselling and medical treatments for addiction.

Type of crime	Explanation	Religious response
Hate crime	Use violence & target a person because of race, religion, gender, sexuality or disability	Christians believe in the greatest commandment “love one another.” Hate crimes are not acceptable in modern Britain. People should love & respect & care for each other.
Theft	Possessions are taken from a victim	“Do not steal” (10 commandment) Both Christians & Muslims would not allow theft to feed a family – no stealing
Murder	Taking of a life involving great pain & suffering	“You shall not kill.” (10 Commandments) – all life is sacred (sanctity of life) & belongs to God. “Do not take life which belongs to God.” (Quran)

Key Vocabulary...

Social justice	People should be treated fairly whether they are rich or poor
Human rights	The rights all people should have and are entitled to because they are human.
Prejudice	Having an opinion which is not based on fact- judging someone based on a biased opinion.
Discrimination	Taking action against someone based on a prejudice
Positive discrimination	Treating someone more favourably because they have been discriminated against in the past to help create more equality of opportunity
Religious freedom	Being able to believe or practice a religion
Religious expression	Being able to worship and practice a faith freely without persecution,
Persecution	Being bullied and hated based on religious belief or race.
Sadaqah	Voluntary giving to charity, time or money, in Islam
Exploitation	Misuse of money or power to make others do things for unfair reward or treatment. Being paid unfairly or being charged too much interest on loans.
People trafficking	Illegal movement of people (modern day slavery).
Emergency aid	Help to support people in the short term due to a disaster or war
Development aid	Help and support to people over the long term to help tackle poverty.

Paying people a fair price for their work or goods to reduce and tackle poverty



Christian Aid
A charity which helps to tackle poverty in the UK and overseas.



Muslim Aid
An Islamic charity which helps Muslims in need.
